Treasurer's Report

WILLIAM CHEADLE - TREASURER

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to present the Treasurer's Report for Gordon Rugby Football Club Ltd for the fiscal year 2024. This report outlines the financial performance, key revenue sources, and notable events of the Club during the past year.

The Club's trading revenue for 2024 reached \$1,241,749 showing a 4% decrease compared to the prior year. The operating loss for 2024FY was \$14,717. The current year experienced a decrease in bar & gate takings due to bad weather conditions affecting three of our home games. I also note that there was a unbudgeted \$14,720 expense associated with the termination of contractual gym & physiotherapy services.

I note that merchandise sales increased by 46% from the prior year to \$40,567 as a result of improved stock management & product design.

Our sincere appreciation to our sponsors for contributing over \$552,458 for the year. Sponsorship remains the Club's primary source of income. The Friends of Gordon Foundation provided \$67,447 in financial support, an increase of \$12,007 from the prior year. We value their continued support and adherence to the Australian Sports Foundation charter.

The Club experienced growth in player registrations, particularly in the Colts and Women's programs, with a large growth in women player registration payments.

Membership revenue increased by 12% from the prior year. The club is intent on further growing membership revenue in the forthcoming year with a campaign set to kick off in the new calendar year.

The 2024FY Financial Statements have been prepared and audited by Mark Arthur of Crispin & Jeffery, and his team. These statements will be lodged with ASIC.

The continued success of this great club relies on the hard work of our dedicated volunteers, who continue to support the Club. We express our heartfelt thanks to all supporters, sponsors, stakeholders, volunteers, and players for their staunch support throughout the 2024 season.

In conclusion, the board has agreed on a budget for the forthcoming 2025 financial year, with the clear intention to obtain profitability. We look forward to a successful 2025 season with the continued support of our rugby community.

1st Grade Report

HARRY FEHILY - 1st GRADE HEAD COACH

I feel that 2024 was an opportunity missed in 1st Grade and across the whole club but then again, the group had to deal with an extraordinary amount of change and adversity. I have personally coined the season gone as the "Year of Change".

The year started off with attempting to address the clubs lack of playing numbers across lower grades. From a high of 120 or so players in 2020, player depth had dropped as low as 82 players. This was compounded with the high turnover of 1st grade players, with 10 starting players leaving for professional contracts or retiring. Coupled with this were several off-field issues that required to be addressed and navigated. The pre-season saw a new General Manager join, a new physiotherapy provider start five days before round one, a new gymnasium facility, a new Head Coach, an entire new coaching staff across Grade, an administrative issue which meant the club only had one trial instead of three and to top it all off, the club would be handed a points deduction midseason for yet another administrative issue.

When you take all of this into account it is extraordinary what this playing group across all our programs managed to achieve this year. The Club finished 2nd in the Club Championships, every team across Grade, Colts and Women's made the finals, 1st Grade finished tied 1st in the regular season (if you had taken away our points deduction), everyone baring 1st Grade made week two of finals, 1st Grade Colts made the grand final, the women's team made the grand final and Grade managed to lift its playing pool to 124 by the end of the year.

It would have been easy for the group to say it was a re-build year but that is a cop out. There are no such things as "re-build years" at successful clubs.

As mentioned previously, I feel like 1st Grade missed an opportunity this year. The year started with dealing with the high turnover and embedding in a new coaching staff as well as a change of system and philosophy. To add to the complexity, we would hand out eighteen 1st Grade debuts in 2024. This was always going to lead to few teething issues. The season started with two losses away at Two Blues and Easts. I can't but not feel like it was the by-product of not having our trials. However, you could see the progress in the group across those two games. We would get our first win in Round 3 versus Newcastle and go on to win the next 6 games in a row. This would parachute us to a top of the table clash in round nine against Warringah, where we would lose narrowly in very wet conditions. The team bounced back the following week against West Harbour to close out the first half of the year.

Round 11 (Norths AWAY), Round 12 (Manly HOME), Round 13 (Randwick AWAY) and Round 14 (East HOME) was going to test the team and likely determine where we would finish the regular season. We started off with a strong away win in the wet against Norths and had one of our best performances of the year at home vs Manly in a big win. The next two games would probably highlight where this group was at. Randwick away saw us lose narrowly and again the following week we would lose narrowly to Easts at home. Both games were there to be won. We lacked a bit of composure when it mattered, and this is often the difference between a settled team who have been together for a while and a group that were still maybe feeling each other out under pressure.



The group bounced back strongly and won the last four games of the season at home, with the Norths game being a highlight.

With our points deduction we would finish the season 4th instead of tied first. This would see us to travel away to Coogee for the third year in a row in the finals.

The team was as well prepared for a game as I have seen in my time at Gordon, and we were confident we could get the job done. Some of the confidence came from finishing the regular season with the best defence. A special mention must go to my Assistant Coach, Liam Winton. I am very lucky to have one of the best coaches in the competition by my side. As with all finals game there were a few momentum swings in the first half, but I felt we were always on top and took a slender lead into half time. The boys came out the blocks with a bang in the second half and pushed out to a 29-14 lead. At this point I made a tactical substitution which would change the flow of the game against us. I must take responsibility for this. The pace of the game slowed as a consequence which left them into it. They got a lucky bounce of a ball for their first try and then Andrew Deegan managed to wrestle control of the territory battle. They were an experienced side who knew how to win, and we struggled to control momentum like we did in those games vs Randwick and Easts earlier in the year.

This group will have learned a lot from that game against Randwick and so has their coaching staff.



We are lucky that the vast majority of the playing group and the entire coaching staff are back for year two of this project. We will get the job done next year.

I want to say thank you to all the staff that worked across the Grade program this year. A huge thank you to our medical and strength & conditioning team -Gabi Jackson, Lachie Mackinnon, and Nic O'Donohue. To our 1st Grade Manager, Greg Easy, who I would be well and truly lost without. Michael Spalding and Chris Cooper who operated in club mentors' roles for the year and who helped me navigate some tricky situations. Andrew Quinn, who doubles as our 2nd Grade Manager and club photographer. Craig Smith, who built the club a brand-new website this year and helped the coaching staff develop their use of technology. Toby Parr, Brendan Mitchell and Thomas Ragell, who went agonisingly close to a 4th Grade premiership this year. Ryan Oakes, who headed up our Development Squad this year. Ryan will step up to 2nd grade for the upcoming year. Jordan Goddard in his role as 2nd assistant coach. Jordan will also make the step up to 1st Grade for this coming year. Mick Adams in his role as Head Coach of 2nd Grade and 1st Grade backs Coach. I was truly luck to have such a close-knit staff and it was a pleasure to work with them.

I would finally like to say a short goodbye to Brendan Mitchell and Mick Adams. Brendan takes a step back from coaching this year, but I truly hope he returns to it in time. He was an exceptional player and highly intelligent coach/lineout operator. He will be missed.



Mick Adams will leave a huge hole in this club. In the immediate term, 2nd Grade won't realise at how lucky they were to have him, but they will in time.

He is an outstanding coach and even better person. I personally would not have got through this season without him always being available to hash out ideas no matter the day or time. Forthright with his opinion and consistently the first person to put his hand up to do the jobs that nobody else wants. If he stays in coaching, he will have a big future. In the meantime I am sure Jess and his two boys, Archie and Hudson, will enjoy having him at home a bit more. I wish them the best of luck in their move to the Gold Coast.

As we close out 2024 and look ahead to 2025, I am very excited about what is to come. I urge you all to get down to Chatswood Oval next year to watch this group do something special. It is coming

2nd Grade Report

MICK ADAMS - 2nd GRADE COACH

Ah, second grade. The noble, long-suffering middle child of the rugby world. It's the place where you look at the team sheet on a Monday thinking "how could we lose this week", only to be cruelly dashed as players are plucked away for first grade like grapes from a vine through injury, talent or just plain and simple hard work.

It's the place where all the boys are 'happy' yet somewhat disappointed to be as the team lists are read out for another week as they all aspire to be running out as the whistle blows at 3.00pm with First Grade. But, despite the near-misses and the heartbreaks along the way, we show up week after week, ready to give it everything we've got. Why? Because every time one of our own earns the call-up to First Grade, it's proof of the dedication, grit, and talent we've built together as a top squad. And besides, any moment in a Gordon jersey is a moment worth playing for.

In 2024, we set out to change the culture of Second Grade as a coaching group, creating a "Top Squad" that included around 40 players each week. The goal was to elevate the program by introducing a level of professionalism mirroring what players experience in First Grade. This meant a deeper focus on game tactics, pre- and post-game analysis, and setting higher standards across the board. The demands on both players and coaching staff increased, but the results showed it was worth the effort. We hit the ground running, and after the first six rounds, we sat near the top of the ladder with a solid 4 wins, 1 loss (to eventual Grand Finalists Eastern Suburbs), and 1 draw after Randwick snuck in a penalty at the buzzer—a tough lesson for the group but a valuable one.





As the season progressed, competition within the squad heated up, with genuine First Grade talent regularly stepping up and leading from the front. Our forward pack became known for its size, aggression, and hard edge, thanks to players like Will Bremner, Hugh Margin, Cameron Wood, Alex Humfrey, and Harry Holland. The return of Nathaniel Pannozzo from a broken leg added some real finesse to our set piece, particularly at lineout time, while skipper Cass Clinton proved to be a club star in the making—tenacious in defence, silky in attack, and a leader who'd run through walls for the tartan jersey. In the backs, Sam Babb and Tom Price orchestrated the team beautifully, setting the platform for attacking firepower from the likes of Dom Easy, Faiva Faiva, Ben Fitzgerald, and Mike Pavlakis. These guys had a knack for stealing the glory, scoring off the hard graft of forwards who spent 15 brutal phases earning the space.

The second half of the season saw us truly establish ourselves as contenders, winning 6 of our final 9 games. We took some big scalps, including Manly, Randwick, and Norths, while narrowly missing out against Easts and letting a couple of games slip that we probably should've closed out. The tightness of the competition meant every result mattered, and we ultimately finished 4th—just one win away from 2nd and one loss away from 6th.

With our finals spot secured, we kicked off against Sydney University in the Semi-Finals. The boys brought an intensity that should set the standard moving forward, bullying the Uni pack on our way to a dominant 20-8 victory. Next, we faced Manly in the Elimination Final.



We came out firing, playing some of our best rugby of the season to lead 31-12 with 30 minutes to play. But rugby can be cruel, and in an unbelievable turn of events, Manly found another gear, putting on 42 unanswered points to knock us out 54-31. It was a tough pill to swallow, but if that loss doesn't light a fire in the belly for 2025, I'm not sure what will.

Reflecting on the season, it's clear that while we didn't achieve our ultimate goal of lifting the Colin Caird Cup, we've built something special. The growth, resilience, and camaraderie this team displayed are successes in their own right. With young talent like Oli Hannan, Ben Holman, Zac Davidson, Luke Tucker, and players from our Colts program coming through in 2025, the future of the club looks incredibly bright.

None of this would've been possible without the incredible support behind the scenes. Huge thanks to our medical and strength & conditioning team—Gabi Jackson, Lachie Mackinnon, and Nic O'Donohue keeping the boys in top shape. A special mention goes to Andrew Quinn ("Quinny"), the busiest man in a Gordon jersey every Saturday. Whether it's running water, filming highlights, or ensuring the boys have fresh content for Instagram, Quinny does it all. Thanks to him, the lads can keep impressing their "fans" online while reminding everyone just how elite they are. Lastly, to my partner-in-crime, Jordy Goddard—an outstanding coach and an even better bloke. It's been a privilege working alongside you, and your passion for the club and its players is unmatched.

3rd Grade Report

RYAN OAKS – 3rd GRADE HEAD COACH

The 2024 season for Gordon 3rd Grade was a memorable journey filled with highs, lows, and immense growth. The team not only adhered to its ethos of emulating the attitude and playing style of higher grades but also cultivated an inclusive and social environment that strengthened bonds on and off the field. From the very beginning, the group demonstrated resilience and camaraderie that would define their season.

The season began with an emphatic 38-0 win over the Two Blues away from home, a near-perfect start that showcased the team's fitness, flair, and discipline. However, the following week brought a tough 47-24 loss to a welldrilled Easts side. Despite the setback, the team took valuable lessons in defensive structure and game management. An early bye allowed time to regroup and refocus, and they returned with a stunning 46-12 victory at home against Sydney Uni, a match that would stand out as one of the season's best performances.

A narrow 17-10 loss to Manly away in Round 5 highlighted the team's fighting spirit but underscored areas for improvement in converting opportunities. The response was impressive, with back-to-back wins over Randwick (31-26 away) and Eastwood (28-15 away), showing the group's ability to bounce back and adapt to challenges. The attacking flair of the team was on full display in a dominant 61-21 win at home against Souths, a game that celebrated their cohesion and expansive playing style.

As the season progressed, the team's grit and determination shone through.



A gritty 16-6 win over Warringah away epitomised their defensive resolve, while two narrow losses to West Harbour (13-10) and Norths (25-19) tested their resilience. These tough outings only strengthened the group's focus and commitment. In Round 12, the team delivered a thrilling 31-24 win over Manly at home, demonstrating their ability to learn from earlier losses. Although the following matches against Randwick (39-15) and Easts (52-0) reminded the team of the importance of consistency, they finished the regular season strongly with four consecutive wins. Victories over Souths (35-10 away), West Harbour (31-22 away), Norths (22-17 home), and the Two Blues (43-10 home) capped off the campaign, with the Norths game showcasing their defensive effort and desire. This run of games cemented a strong 4th place position and a place in the finals.

Despite finishing the regular season on a high, the finals campaign proved challenging. A hard-fought 20-12 loss to Manly in the semi-final paved a challenging road to the Grand Final which showed in the 50-12 defeat in the elimination final to a strong East's side which marked the end of the season. While these results were disappointing, the experience gained was invaluable for the young squad, which showed immense potential and growth throughout the year.

The season's highlights included key victories against Sydney Uni at home, Randwick away, Warringah away, and Norths at home, showcasing the team's ability to rise to the occasion and deliver under pressure.

- The assets of the Friends of Gordon Foundation Ltd are kept separate from those of the Gordon Rugby Football Club Ltd.
- The decision as to the expenditure of the donations is made independently by the Board of the Friends of Gordon Foundation Ltd
- All Friends of Gordon Foundation donors are welcome to review the financial records, attend any Board meetings or provide any input or suggestions for future projects or fundraising activities.

The Friends of Gordon Foundation Ltd ACN 24 652 665 506 (the "Foundation") is established as a fundraising partner of the Australian Sports Foundation ("ASF").





The Foundation is registered with and conducted under the charter of the ASF. The ASF was established by the Australian Government to raise funds through public and corporate donations for the development of sport in Australia. The ASF's listing in the Income Tax Assessment Act (1977) means donations of \$2 or more are tax deductible. Registration with the ASF allows donations to the ASF in support of the Foundation to attract tax deduction.

Financial Performance

The Foundation raised \$ 134,894 in the financial year 1 November 2023 to 31 October 2024.

The Foundation paid Gordon Rugby Football Club Ltd Grants totalling \$67,447.47 under the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding under the following categories.

- Sporting Equipment \$ 2,260.00
- Facilities and Ground Upgrade \$ 8,442.46
- Participation and Development Programs \$ 4,042.50
- Athlete and Welfare Support \$50,602.51
- Travel Costs \$ 2,100

In addition, the Foundation made an advance payment of \$ 4,500 on behalf of the Gordon Rugby Football Club to the Trumper Pavilion Centenary Celebrations held on 2 November 2024. This payment was funded outside of the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding with Gordon Rugby Football Club Ltd.
